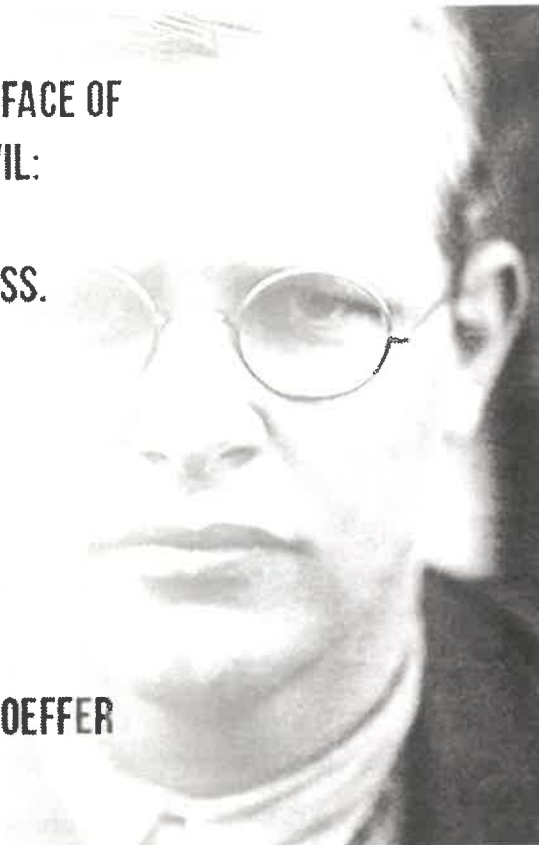

REFLECTION

THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP

German Lutheran pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote a book titled *The Cost of Discipleship*. Bonhoeffer knew that cost firsthand. As a disciple of Jesus, Bonhoeffer risked everything, including his life, in order to resist Hitler and the spread of Nazism. Bonhoeffer argues that as Christianity spread, the church became involved with the state, and secularization set in. The call to discipleship became exclusive to religious professionals like monks and nuns. Ordinary Christians, even some clergy, saw their Christian life as a practice of keeping rules rather than submitting to the “yoke of Christ” in full discipleship. For a disciple is more than a follower. When Jesus called his disciples to follow him, he was not enlisting part-time or seasonal volunteers; he was asking those who would be his own for total, unconditional and persevering commitment. In the Gospels we see some people who were followers of Jesus who turned away when they were challenged to become disciples. Discipleship involves accepting and integrating into our lives the teachings and values of the one whose disciple we become. This is of course aspirational: the ideal for which a would-be disciple must constantly strive.

In today’s Gospel, as he does frequently in his teachings, Jesus uses hyperbole to drive home this point. The requirement that we “hate” father and mother should be seen in the light of Hebrew literary conventions and the whole of Scripture. Some other translations of Luke make Jesus’ meaning a little clearer to us: “If you want to be my disciple, you must hate everyone else *by comparison*” (NLT). We can also compare this saying in Luke with its parallel in Matthew (10:37): “Whoever loves father or mother [or son or daughter] more than me is not worthy of me.” It helps to understand that in a variety of passages, the Hebrew scriptural idiom uses the contrast between “love” and “hatred” to describe preference. For example, in dealing with inheritances in polygamous marriages, the Mosaic Law, literally translated, referred to “two wives, one beloved, and another hated” (Deut 21:15, KJV). But, as subtler translations make clear, the law was not indicating emotional hatred on the part of the husband, only lower priority. Jesus’ point is not that we are to be heartless toward our families, only that we must esteem Him more highly than the people we love here on earth – so much so that our earthly loves pale in comparison. This should not be mistaken for renunciation of one’s familial responsibilities, an action for which Jesus castigated the Pharisees (Mark 7:12). Rather, discipleship calls for a reordering of one’s values and priorities so that Jesus is one’s first love.

The passage “whoever does not give up all their possessions cannot be my disciple” challenges us to internalize and activate the message of what could be required if we were called to live in true solidarity with the poor and marginalized: those people of God who do without much of what we consider ordinary or even necessary. Disciples are also to cultivate wisdom and practical sense and are to seek out the advice of others, all the while praying to recognize and accept God’s grace as it is given. Like the builder of the tower and the king marching into battle, disciples must keep their wits about them and make realistic, strategic decisions about the costs, available resources, and consequences – in order to see the journey through.
